



Center for Family Services is guided by a strong code of ethics. This agency strives to lead by example. **Center for Family** Services will conduct business at the highest standards at all times.




Collaboration

Assisted Re-entry for Maximum Success (ARMS)

The Assisted Re-entry Program for Crawford County targets individuals often overlooked and under-served: Those leaving prison with few supports which increases the potential to commit another crime. Addressing housing needs and providing concurrent wrap-around services, this program creates a seamless, holistic approach to a historically under-served population.





of Rescued and Redistributed Food

Rescued food refers to high-quality, surplus food that would otherwise go to waste but is instead collected and redistributed to those in need. This includes items from grocery stores, restaurants, and farms that are still safe and nutritious but may be unsellable due to reasons like excess supply or approaching expiration dates. By incorporating rescued food into our food pantries, we not only help reduce food waste but also provide essential nourishment to families facing food insecurity.

Parenting Education:

Our Parenting Education program offers tailored support to parents, equipping them with the skills and knowledge needed to nurture healthy family dynamics. Using hands-on guidance and evidence-based practices, parents learn effective communication, positive discipline, and strategies to promote their children's emotional and developmental well-being.



Homemaking:

Our Homemaking services assist families in creating safe, organized, and nurturing home environments. We provide practical support in household management, such as addressing hoarding tendencies that may create unhealthy living conditions for children.



In-Home Counseling:

Our In-Home Counseling program delivers personalized, compassionate support directly in the family's living environment or at a location that best suits the family's needs. Our trained professionals address emotional and behavioral challenges, provide acute crisis intervention, and work collaboratively with families to develop coping strategies and strengthen relationships.



Anger Management:

This program helps individuals, particularly those with a mental health diagnosis, learn to regulate their emotions, understand their triggers, and improve conflict resolution skills. The program also explores the fight, flight, or freeze response as it relates to trauma-induced anger.

Special Outreach Services (S.O.S.)

Our Special Outreach Services (S.O.S.) offer preventative programs designed to support individuals and families dealing with mental health challenges.

Parenting Program:

Provides preventative education for individuals with a mental health diagnosis who are facing parenting challenges.

One-on-One Anger Management Counseling Program:

Assists individuals, particularly those with a mental health diagnosis, in regulating emotions, understanding triggers, and improving conflict resolution skills. The program also addresses trauma-induced anger through the concepts of fight, flight, or freeze.

Self-Pay Supervised Visitation Services

The Center for Family Services (CFS) offers Self-Pay Supervised Visitation Services, providing a neutral and safe environment for parents to visit with their children. These services are designed to support parents involved in custodial mediation or those with an agreed visitation schedule, ensuring quality parenting time under professional supervision.



Service Provider of the Year Award


Caitlin Stewart



Adopt-A-Family

Local families are identified throughout the year and adopted during the Holidays. These families are experiencing financial difficulties and have unique situations. The program is unique because it assists the entire family, not only children. Many of our adopters assist with anything from gifts to groceries to utility bills.

Sol Stern Shoe Program

In 1908, Samuel and Sol Stern took \$2,500 and created the Sol Stern Shoe program that focuses on providing shoes and socks to children in preschool and K-12. Since that initial trust, the project has been a yearly initiative that supplies over \$12,000 of shoes to children in Meadville each year.

Personal Care Items, Diapers & Formula

Our Personal Care Closet offers items such as soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, feminine products, and toilet paper. On a case-by-case basis, we assist families with little ones and those facing a serious financial crisis with diapers and formula.

Thrift Store

Our store offers a wonderful opportunity to find unique items at bargain prices. Thanks to the generosity of the community, we're able to provide a wide selection of affordable, one-of-a-kind deals. Reselling and reusing clothing and household goods not only saves money but also promotes environmental responsibility. Items that do not sell or cannot be used in the store are donated to World Mission (Global) or Planet Aid, and metal items and electronics are set aside for recycling. We also reuse plastic, paper, and fabric shopping bags to minimize waste.
